Family-owned campground marks its 35th anniversary

It was an historic occasion with a decidedly different beat as members of the Foxboro High School Jazz Ensemble were guests of the Daniels family to celebrate the 35th anniversary of Normandy Farms Campground and RV Park on West Street.

It was also Mardi Gras Weekend at the popular campground and a recreational vehicle show had been planned as well, but for a solid hour, the young musicians of Foxboro High were center stage before a most appreciative audience. Many of the greats of the jazz world were represented in selections and a real crowdpleaser was the sentimental "I'll Be Seeing You," a classic from the World War II era.

his wife Jan on land that had been continuously farmed by members of the Daniels family since 1759. Norm was the sixth generation on the land. His children, Albert (Dan), Robert and Janis, their children and grandchildren are the 7th, 8th and 9th generations.

Dan singled out many campers for special recognition, some of whom have been patronizing the campground for 30 years.

Also recognized were long-term employees including Lisa Hall with more than 25 years. Staff members with 20 years included Steve Lovell, Jean Lincoln and Luanne MacAulay. Lester Goodwin followed with 12 and Bryan McLean with 10.

The Daniels family found itself on the receiving end of recognition as

Barry Johnson of Crossroads RV presented them a plaque recognizing not only their 35 years in business but the receipt of the 2005-06 designation of Campground of the Year (their third).

Reflecting on the earlier years, Dan recalled the challenges of farm life, the years of raising chickens and sheep, the sharing of the family land between Norman Daniels and his brother Doug, who started a tree farm on the opposite side of the road.

The Daniels family, which has raised in excess of \$100,000 in a sustained commitment to the Jimmy Fund and the battle against cancer in children, turned the anniversary celebration into yet another good will mission.
